Please include your name; the street address of the nominee, and a brief explanation of why you think the building or residence deserves an award in one of these categories:


- 1. **Historic Design Award** for a new building in the downtown area that complements the original historic buildings or enhances the Downtown Historic District area
- 2. Historic Commercial Building Award for a building at least 50 years old in the downtown Historic District or on an Historic Site that restores, retains or preserves the building's historical, cultural or architectural values.
- 3. **Historic House Award** for a home that is at least 50 years old that is an outstanding example of restoration and renovation. Exterior only.
- 4. Certificate of Commendation for residential, commercial or "other". This could be for new construction, restoration, renovation, additions, landscaping, painting or significant improvement.

WE'VE BEEN BUSY! Recent Accomplishments:

Heritage Luncheon and Oral History Films - Our second annual luncheon and viewing of oral history films took place on Sunday, January 20th at Old City Hall. Thanks to **Joanie Lewis**, who shepherded the project, and 152 West Film Productions it was another big success. Mineko Sakai, Angelo Benassi, Don Christopher, Bill Spendlove and Mike Casares were all fascinating subjects for different reasons. We're already planning for next year's film. Our friends at Express Media Graphics were able to make us copies of the DVD. They are available for \$10 at the Museum.

City Agreement Signed – The formal agreement between the City of Gilroy and the Gilroy Historical Society for staffing the museum with city-vetted volunteers has finally been signed by approved by the City Attorney and signed by Gabe Gonzalez, the City Administrator on Feb. 25, 2019. Either party may review it annually, but runs for four years until Dec. 31, 2022. The City will continue supplying the Museum with utilities, wifi, computer service linked to the city, custodial and landscape maintenance and other services, as the Museum is part of the Recreation Department. The Society agreed to provide liability insurance, which will no doubt be needed when we are able to hire a part time Museum Curator.

<u>Gilroy Train Station National Register Application</u> was submitted to the State Office of Historic Preservation in December. The 35-page application was painstakingly detailed in every respect. We had to submit additional recent photos along with a revised sketch map. Applicants should be held to a high standard, right? It was formally accepted a month later and has now been scheduled for

presentation to the State Historic Resources Commission on May 8th in Palm Springs. Who wants to go with us??

Rotary Grant for Amah Mutsun Exhibit – Robyn Houts and Connie Rogers attended the Tuesday noon Rotary club on January 29th. The Society received a \$500 grant from Rotary to support the revised Amah Mutsun exhibit, which Robyn is creating at the Museum. We hope to have a Grand Opening when it is ready for viewing!

<u>Education Committee Visits Classrooms</u> –We are so fortunate to have <u>Maureen Hunter</u>, <u>Robyn Houts</u> and <u>Joe Robinson</u>, all experienced teachers on our Education Committee, and have been giving them a workout. They made <u>ten</u> classroom visits in January to Eliot, Clenview and DelBuono Schools.

<u>Programs at the Gilroy Library</u> – On February 16th we co-sponsored a program with the library featuring Jan Adkins, the author of Black Americans in Santa Clara County. She presented an interesting power point and included two Gilroy residents, Ivie Anderson and Sam MacDonald.

On March 2nd the library sponsored a program related to Silicon Valley Reads, which this year is about finding your roots. Gilroy resident Shay Azevedo took it a step further with a dramatized presentation about the Horace Willson family, pioneers in San Ysidro. Shay is not only a Willson descendent but also a history lover and actress. She charmed a large audience with her portrayal of Horace's daughter commenting on historic events of the era. Several of our members and more Willson descendents enjoyed the presentation.

PROJECTS IN PROCESS

The City's current Historic Resource Inventory (HRI) was completed in 1986 and is a catalog of 385 historic buildings. Not only is it out of date, but many buildings are not listed. Last spring the City contracted with the Dudek firm to update the inventory. They completed the fieldwork last fall, walking the streets with iPads taking photos and recording data. On February 26th they presented the draft Context Statement to the City's Historic Heritage Committee. This is an abbreviated history of our city, divided into periods of development. Our buildings will be evaluated for their significance against this background. The final result is due late next summer when it will go back to the Historic Heritage Committee, the Planning Commission and City Council for their action.

Looking Ahead to Gilroy's 150th Year

In 2020 (right around the corner) Gilroy will be 150 years old! We were incorporated as a charter city on March 12, 1870. We are the third oldest city in Santa Clara County, right after San Jose and Santa Clara. The Society has been considering how to observe and contribute to this milestone celebration. We are talking about possibly producing a book showing a timeline of our progress through photographs. Mayor Roland Velasco has also called together a group of community members to discuss a broader celebration, not only marking the day but continuing to commemorate it throughout the year. Stay tuned!

New Renewal Date and Dues Structure

During our retreat meeting in August it was decided to change the renewal process for membership in order to avoid confusion.
